Flood Fine Art Gallery: “Ancestors in the Garden” — Repurposed Sculptures by DeWayne “B-Love” Barton

DeWayne Barton, affectionately dubbed “B-Love”, repurposes found objects and trash to create three dimensional sculptures, to inspire people to become heroes and to come up with solutions to social and environmental problems. Co-founder of the Burton Street Community Peace Garden, Green Opportunities, and founder of Hood Hugger International, as well as a member of educational, environmental and social justice organizations, Barton has been an effective artist, poet, teacher, and activist. His artwork has been shown in several galleries and museums, including the Smithsonian Institute, the August Wilson Center for African American Culture, and Duke.

“hunky-shanky-piddygutt” — prints & journals by Saige Hopkins whimsical woodland characters

Saige Hopkins is exhibiting a collection of monoprints inspired by science, daydream, drama, and Western North Carolina folklore, resulting in whimsical characters. Included is Hopkins' first hand-bound book, “Searching for Hill Rubies”, a compilation of excerpts from her mother's journal and her own writing, plus a series of journal entries written by a ghost. Originally from Gerton, NC, Hopkins recently graduated with a Bachelor of Fine Arts from The Cooper Union in New York City. This show is her first independent exhibition in a gallery. Saige is now intentionally living near her childhood home and working to foster its unique spirit; beautiful, bizarre, inclusive.
